

**PROFESSIONAL PROFILE: TOP EXECUTIVE**  
**Mr. Antonio RIGAMONTI**

Mr. Antonio Rigamonti initiated his career in 1964 at the Cotonificio Pietro Bellora (65,000 spindles and 1,000 looms) as the quality control manager and then as responsible of the industrial engineering department. He became the spinning plant manager before joining Werner International in 1970 as a field consultant.

In 1978, he became the supervisor of the Italian territory and up to 1982 monitored all the consulting interventions until his promotion to Vice President for the Latin countries in 1984. In 1988, he became Executive Vice President.


Promoted to President of Werner International in 1992 and then to Chairman and CEO in 1995, Mr. Rigamonti consolidated his reputation worldwide. For family reason, he left the world scene and joined the Italian home textile group ZUCCHI as the Director of the supply chain. Responsible of all manufacturing activities as well as managing the sourcing and logistics for Zucchi Group, he also successfully integrated the supply chain of the parent companies BASSETTI and DESCAMPS.

In 2005, he was called to reduce the manufacturing costs in France and was named President of DESCAMPS, a home textile company owned by the group Zucchi. Mr. Rigamonti successfully optimized the French production activities while reducing the personnel from 1,200 to 400.

Parallel to his various senior positions, Mr. Rigamonti was a visiting professor at the LIUC University in Castellanza, near Milan in Italy, and maintained a program on the "Automation in the textile industry" between 1998 and 2003.

From 2005 to 2009, he was sitting on the Board of MASCIONI, the best processing house for home textile in Europe. From 2003, Mr. Rigamonti is a Director on the ZUCCHI-WELSPUN board, a making-up company and since 2005, he is also on the Board of INTESA, a small weaving company that belongs at 50% to the Zucchi group.

Mr. Rigamonti is a member of the Textile Institute. He received his Associateship (CText ATI) in 1984 and his Fellowship (CtextFTI) in 1990.
